Principal's Message

Presentation Night is the culmination of all the work over the school year – from students, staff, families and the community. It is very rewarding as a Principal to celebrate diverse successes; such as the combined band who played at Presentation Night. This group continues to grow, and this is only possible due to the dedication of the students, parents, teacher Debbie Schwartz and Instrumental Music teacher Helen Stockings. The Year 12 students have grown enormously over the year and are a great advertisement for our school. For those who attended “schoolies” - it was lovely to hear from a past colleague that Yorketown students were “exemplary citizens” during the festival.

The work of our student leaders and wellbeing leaders continues to provide a sense of pride for me as the Principal. One of the most important things for young people to learn is citizenship – the active participation of people in civic life and in contributing to our community ensures that understanding of others is fostered. The work our leaders have done to support a range of causes has helped develop compassion and empathy in our students. Hugo’s recent fundraiser highlighted this sense of community. I would particularly like to thank our School Captains Taylor and Shanai. The commitment that these students have demonstrated to Yorketown Area School is greater than I have experienced in any school.



They have worked tirelessly to improve the learning environment for our students and have also undertaken the “tough” stuff of policy work and student representation on Governing Council and other committees. Taylor led the Formal Committee, which hosted a magical event for our Year 12s. I encourage both of you to continue to take up opportunities in leadership.

I consider myself very lucky to have an active and supportive Governing Council and commend them for their thoughtful discussions that consider the views of all families. I thank the Governing Council for their representation of our families.

To all of the year’s award winners, congratulations, I encourage you to reflect on what you did to achieve your award – success does not come without some strategies, and think about how you can apply these strategies to all areas of your life. While we highlight the best achievements at Presentation Night I remind all students that you have achieved over the year and when I look at your final report, I encourage you to reflect on your achievements and identify where you can work harder.

I started the year by posing the question “Don’t ask students what job they want, ask them what problem they want to solve” (Jamie Casap) in our first newsletter. Ryan Story returned to Yorketown with the Dick-Penske Racing Team highlighting how his passion and imagination led him to become Team Principal for the team. Later in the term, we had Calvin Hart from the Thankyou organization who described how a few young people decided to tackle access to clean water around the world by building a social enterprise. In deciding the problem they wanted to solve, they created their jobs and have now funded water services for 545,360 people (as of July 2017).

Our focus this year has been on encouraging our students to do the “hard thinking” I am very proud of how staff have taken on this task and are working at challenging our students more. The Learning Expo showed some of this work

and we greatly appreciated the support shown by families in participating in this event.

Our catch cry for 2018 will be “Growing minds, shaping hearts, changing lives”. The staff will continue their work on developing critical and creative thinking to “grow minds” and will engage in a more formal pastoral care program including mindfulness to “shape hearts”. This will shape the lives of our students so they can fully engage in the exciting world they will enter, where capabilities such as problem solving, collaboration and even “ability to work with machines” will be highly valued.

As much as the end of the year is about celebrations, it is also about endings. I thank the staff completing contracts for your contributions to our school this year and wish you well in your next positions. We will also farewell two teachers who have served the Yorke Peninsula for a combined 90+ years. Claudia Agnew and Rick Hutchinson have taught generations of Yorke Peninsula students and have become part of the fabric of the community.

To our Year 12s I hope you take your learnings from your education and use them to explore the many options that will open up before you. I remind you of the message from the video at your farewell assembly: *“exercise free will and creative independent thought, not for the satisfactions they will bring you, but for the good they will do others, the rest of the 6.8 billion and those who will follow them. And then, you too will discover the great and curious truth of the human experience is that selflessness is the best thing you can do for yourself.”* (David McCullough – for the video, go to our Facebook page).

Shaping lives is the business of education, Yorketown Area School has been doing this for a long time, and we are committed to ensuring we shape lives for the changing world our students live in.

Grey students get head start in STEM

Applications open today for a new program to make access to science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) easier for 1200 students living in regional and remote areas of Australia.

Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey MP encouraged local students to apply for the scholarships of up to \$18,000, made possible by a \$24 million commitment from the Coalition Government at the last election.

“This is a fantastic opportunity for students to gain the support they need to study in fields with strong employment outcomes,” Mr Ramsey said.

“Accessing higher education from the country presents a range of difficulties that kids who can remain living at home in the city do not face.

These scholarships are about addressing the imbalance between the city and the country by making student life easier for regional students and making STEM courses more attractive study options.

“I urge students from Grey to take advantage of the opportunities these scholarships offer to get the skills they need for future jobs.”

Minister for Education and Training Simon Birmingham said science and innovation were recognised internationally as critical for boosting future growth.

“As well as tackling some of the hurdles regional and rural students face, these scholarships will help boost their numbers in STEM courses where they have been underrepresented,” Minister Birmingham said.

The scholarships will operate from 2017-18 to 2020-21, with the first round of 600 scholarships being awarded for the 2018 academic year, and a second round of 600 for 2019. The first round of applications opens today and closes on 8 January 2018.

Prospective vocational education, undergraduate and postgraduate students (Certificate IV to PhD) are eligible to apply for a Rural and Regional Enterprise Scholarship to support them in their studies in the year ahead.
